




Follow The Money

In the Sandbox With Mikey

What is this thing about etiquette we hear?

Curling is a sport that combines strategy, skill, and this unusual sense of sportsmanship called the *'etiquette of curling'*. The etiquette of curling isn't a set of rules but it is a culture for interpreting and respecting the rules of the game.

This includes allowing the opposing team to have their shot without crowding the sheet, or distracting the opponent from concentrating on or preparing for their shot. When a player or team commits an infraction, it is important to acknowledge and correct the mistake in a convivial manner. If we caused the infraction we can report it to our skip, whose job it is to find a resolution. If an opponent causes it, take up with your own skip first and let the two skips come to the best agreement that addresses the infraction.

Infractions we are likely to see in club curling include a stick-delivery that leaves or breaks the line of delivery, releasing the stone too late at the hog line, hitting the rock with a broom while sweeping it, taking a guard that is protected by the 5-rock-rule off of the sheet, or bumping into a stone in the house with a foot. The skip's will debate what happened and how to set things right again. Slamming the broom on the ice in frustration also fits into this category. But I have never seen it happen in Baysville.

In terms of positioning on the ice, players should stand to the side of the sheet and out of the way of the stone's path.

This is a safety concern first of all. But it becomes an etiquette concern if the throwing team ever feels like they can't prepare for the shot without feeling crowded or distracted. We all get caught up in the social element of this game. And yet everyone is responsible for making sure the game feels enjoyable for our opponent to play their best game. A simple rule of thumb for sweepers is to stand to the side of the sheet that isn't being played on and just outside of the hog line.

This issue is most important when all 16 rocks have been thrown and it is time to count points. Only the vices are ever allowed in the house while counting the score. If ever a third person enters into the fray ask them (and any others), to step out of the house and then start counting rocks undistracted.

To keep an eight-end game within a two-hour time frame, curlers can make sure that the next thrower can step in the hack to deliver a stone. Sweepers from either team can move the next rock the hack. And even clean the running band as a way to get the next stone in play as quickly as possible. There are 128 stones to throw in one game. So 15 seconds of prep time per stone, can delay the game by over half an hour! And that is time that is more fun to invest into choosing the more beautiful shot to play.

Players can also make sure to stay focused and avoid small delays or distractions. Skips can make sure that their calls were heard with a visual signal from the front end. Throwers can confirm what the skip just called with a visual signal. Sweepers should know what shot was called before they start sweeping, in order to communicate how much or how little to sweep. Sidebar conversations with a teammate are held off the side of the sheet so the other team can get set up.

Overall, the etiquette of curling is how we display our respect for the strategy, our opponents, and the rules. By maintaining a positive outlook, curlers can ensure that their games will feel fair and fun to play.
